Just as Will's trying to think this through, the door to the next floor opens. A teenage girl gets on, waves away the smoke from Dead Buck's cigarette. Will doesn't know her, but she knew him. Knew. When they were eight. And stray bullets had cut through the playground, and Will had tried to cover her, but she was hit anyway, and so what she wants to know, on that fifth floor elevator stop, is, what if Will, Will with the gun shoved in the back waistband of his jeans, MISSES. And so it goes, the whole long way down, as the elevator stops on each floor, and at each stop someone connected to his brother gets on to give Will a piece to a

bigger story than the one he thinks he knows. A story that might never know an END...if Will gets off that elevator. Told in short, fierce staccato narrative verse, Long Way Down is a fast and furious, dazzlingly brilliant look at teenage gun violence, as could only be told by Jason Reynolds.

Hard Times illustrated Charles Dickens - Hard Times: For These Times (commonly known as Hard Times) is the tenth novel by Charles Dickens, first published in 1854. The book surveys English society

and satirises the social and economic conditions of the era. "Now, what I want is, Facts. . . . Facts alone are wanted in life." Thus begins Superintendent Mr. Gradgrind—a wealthy, retired merchant—addressing a group of young students at his school in the industrial town of Coketown, England. A rigid man of fact, rational self-interest and realities, he not only teaches his pupils according to the utilitarian principles, but also raises his children with the same philosophy. When they grow up, as their lives begin to turn chaotic, they reproach their father for their upbringing. Will Mr. Gradgrind realize his flaws and become a humble man? Satirizing the laissez-faire system, Dickens' *Hard Times* lays bare the wide gap between the rich and the poor. Criticizing the materialistic

world, this Victorian novel throws light on the value of emotions and the human heart. It has undergone several film and theatre adaptations.

Mooseltoe Firsthand Books

The goal for my Capstone Project was to develop and teach an art lesson that focused on the prehistoric Ocmulgee Earth Lodge at Ocmulgee National Monument and explore how art students responded to it. Several questions were addressed over the course of this investigation. Why is it important for students to learn about the Ocmulgee Earth Lodge at Ocmulgee National Monument and people that made it? What narratives and universal themes can be constructed about the Ocmulgee Earth Lodge? What connections do students make between culture and art?

The Ocmulgee Earth Lodge was created in part to represent a symbolic narrative for the Ocmulgee people. Will studying the universal themes of the Ocmulgee Earth Lodge provide a valuable and local example for students to think about when creating their own meaningful art based on a narrative? What personal narratives and artworks do students generate that share a journey or transformative experience they have had? The Ocmulgee Earth Lodge had practical uses as well as symbolic meaning that conveyed the story and beliefs of prehistoric Southeastern Indians who settled there. For my Capstone Project, I created a two-part lesson for students to explore the significance and meaning of the Ocmulgee Earth Lodge and to make their

own artworks based on personal narratives. I taught my lesson to my 5th grade art class at a public school in middle Georgia and used action research to analyze the implementation of my lesson and my class's experience. I have presented my work and students' work in this paper as well as in a summary website
